### Greensboro Branch Nominates Dr. Lakshmi Iyer as Woman of the Year at Women to Women Luncheon October 19, 2015



The Greensboro Branch was proud to nominate Dr. Lakshmi Iyer for her impressive work advancing access of girls to STEM education through her unique IT is for Girls weeklong summer camp and the annual Triad Tech Savvy one-day program, both held on the UNCG Campus. Dr. Iyer has received four AAUW National Grants making Greensboro one of only 21 sites in the National holding Tech Savvy events.

The STEM3 Triad Tech Savvy 2016 was awarded \$5000 in early October and the event is scheduled for Saturday April 9, 2016 in Sullivan Science at UNCG. Girls in sixth through ninth grades will be invited to register to attend along with their parents.

### AAUW \$start \$mart at UNCG's Bryan School of Business and Economics



On Wednesday evening November 4, thirty-six young women students attended a \$start\$mart salary negotiation workshop sponsored by the UNCG Bryan School of business and economics. The undergraduate juniors and seniors were enthusiastic about learning how to start early to gain pay equity. Hands shot up to contribute to the discussion about budgeting, researching a potential job opportunity, and debriefing after role playing an interview for a career position.
