AAUW Public Policy Advocacy is moving forward with the Pilot Project using new sources of information. A recent Webinar gave us information on CQStateTrack, a source for NC pending bills/actions. We are seeking those who might be interested in receiving "alerts" and responding to them. The branches are encouraged to select issues of interest. Last year the branch chose Women's Health, Medicare and Social Security. Other branches chose Education, Women's Health and Reproductive Rights, Voter and Civil Rights, Equal Pay and Equal Opportunity, Campaign Reform, and Environmental Issues. Be considering on what you'd like the branch to concentrate during 2013-14.
