IN MEMORY

Former branch member Dr. Mary Floyd passed away on June 6 in Indianapolis from complications of lung cancer. She was 75.

Mary lived in Greensboro from 1991 to 2009 and was professor emerita of history at UNCG, where she taught for 26 years. She specialized in Latin American history. After retiring, she returned to Indianapolis, her home town, to care for her mother, who died in February at age 95.

Several Greensboro branch members offered fond reflections of Mary, who served as branch treasurer. Mary was also a recipient of an AAUW American Fellowship which awards women "on the basis of scholarly excellence; quality and originality of project design; and active commitment to helping women and girls through service in their communities, professions, or fields of research."
